Origin of Black History Month

The roots of Black History Month were planted in 1915, only 50 years after slavery was abolished in the United States, by Carter G. Woodson and Rev. Jesse E. Moorland with "Negro History Week." September of 1915, the Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH), an organization dedicated to researching and promoting achievements by Black Americans and other peoples of African descent.

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DEI DATA SPOTLIGHT

Black or African American Employees in the overall State of Delaware Executive Branch Workforce

The Division of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion along with all State agencies are committed to ensuring Diversity and Equal Employment Opportunities across all state jobs. This is exemplified by the steady increase in Black Representation in the overall Executive Branch workforce in the last five years. Additionally, Black Representation has significantly increased in the Officials and Administrators, Professionals and Protective Services job categories since 2018, showing growth in decision making and public facing roles.

The table below shows the representation of Black or African American Employees in the overall State of Delaware Executive Branch Workforce. In the table, Black representation is broken down by both gender and EEO-4 employment categories. The EEO-4 designations are broad employment categories, of which all State employees are designated, that are used to simplify and standardize the method of reporting. The eight EEO-4 Categories are Officials and Administrators, Professionals, Technicians, Protective Service, Paraprofessionals, Administrative Support, Skilled Craft, and Service Maintenance.

Black employees represent 28.46% of the total workforce a 0.5% increase from last Fiscal Year (FY22). Black employees overall (male and female), are highly represented in the Paraprofessionals EEO-4 job category at (52%), followed by Service Maintenance (42%), and Office Clerical (31%). However. Black employees continue to underrepresentation in the Technician and Skilled Craft job categories, representing only 14% and 9% of those job categories respectively.






